Why are parental controls important?

Parental controls are the names for a group of settings that put you in control of what content your child can see. Combined with privacy settings, these can help you protect your children from inappropriate content, online grooming, cyberbullying and other [online safety issues](#).

Remember that parental control settings are only one part of online safety. Make sure to keep having [regular conversations about their online lives](#) to stay on top of any issues that come up.

Unsure if a new game is appropriate for your child?

It can be difficult to know if the latest game is age appropriate for your child. PEGI ratings give recommendations but many parents choose to make their own choice. [Common Sense Media](#) is a great website that gives trusted ratings with families in mind. It covers games, apps, podcasts as well as books and movies, allowing you to make an informed choice.

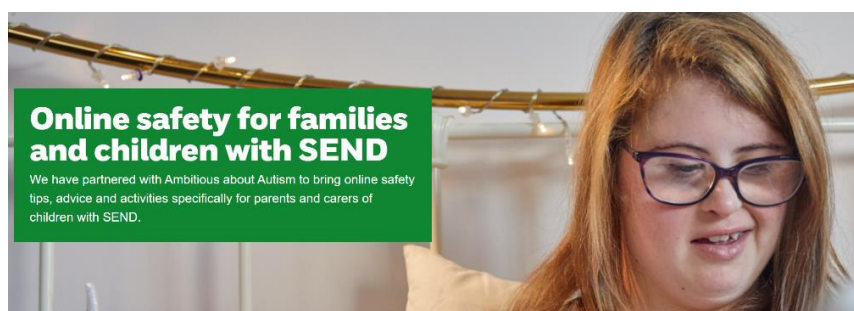

We've designed a simple checklist to give you peace of mind regarding your child's safety on the internet.

Set your children's device up before you give it to them so you know they're safe online as soon as they start playing.



Get started



Set parental controls on your broadband to prevent your children seeing things they shouldn't



For smart phones check parental controls are also set up on the mobile network

Set up the device safely



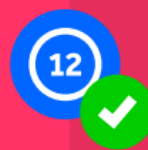
Use the device setting so you can only download age appropriate apps and games



Disable location services so your child doesn't unintentionally share their location with others



Set up password control or disable in-app purchasing so big bills are not run up accidentally



Download age appropriate apps you're happy for your child to use

Talk about staying safe



If your children are 8-10 years old, download our parent / child Internet Matters app to help you talk about e-safety issues in an interactive way.



Be aware of key issues and how to discuss them with your children so they know how to stay safe online



If your child is using social networking apps check their profile and privacy settings, making sure they are not sharing personal or private information with people they do not know

All staff are alert to the signs of abuse and neglect and follow our procedures to ensure that children receive effective support and protection.

[Operation Encompass- this is a national programme which runs jointly between schools and police forces](#) ensures early reporting to schools that a child/young person has been exposed to domestic abuse

Prevent

Prevent is part of the UK government's counter-terrorism strategy, [CONTEST](#). Its aim is to stop people becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism.

The Counter Terrorism and Security Act 2015 places a statutory duty on specified authorities to have "due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism".

The strategy involves thousands of people – police and intelligence officers, the emergency services, local authorities, businesses, voluntary and community organisations, governments and other partners – working in together across the UK and the world to protect the public.



[NSPCC website and specifically the NSPCC PANTS campaign](#) helps children to understand how they keep themselves safe and the PANTS campaign helps parents to talk to children in an age appropriate way about keeping themselves safe from sexual abuse.

risk of children/young people being abused and exploited- how to keep children safe

***child abuse can take a range of different forms.** It is any action by another person (adult or child) that causes harm to a child. It can be defined as physical, emotional, sexual abuse or neglect.

***risk of harm to children/young people is also present in the community**, for example: online safety, cyberbullying, domestic violence and abuse, radicalisation and extremism, child trafficking and modern slavery, County Lines, female genital mutilation, gang activity

***teaching children/young people about how to look after themselves and keep safe-** good physical, emotional and mental health and well-being; being aware of signs and symptoms that may indicate concern for a child; providing time to listen and talk, teaching children about how to keep themselves safe
