

Learning Exploration: Turning the Tide on Plastic

Being in a coastal community, we are surrounded by beautiful ocean landscapes. However, our oceans are under threat from human actions. Pollution and the build-up of plastic in the oceans threatens some of the sea life locally while rising global temperatures pose a risk to marine animals across the globe. Rising sea levels also pose problems involving coastal erosion which will affect our relationship with the ocean we live so close to.

In this exploration, we will examine what challenges we face locally regarding pollution and erosion. We will consider how Britain being an island has shaped its history and the advantages and disadvantages this has had. We will also consider the future of island nations and how we can communicate our concerns through art to raise awareness of these issues.

Hook into learning: Where in the World?

Guess the island puzzle based on a 'message in a bottle.' Children have to figure out where in the world they are based on clues.

Journey through the exploration

- What are the challenges of living in an island nation?
- How does human activity influence the habitats they live in?
- · How has Britain been an island shaped its history?
- Do islands have a future?
- How can we use art to make people more environmentally conscious?

Children will explore the following genres of writing:

Opportunities for writing across the curriculum:

- Science: Opportunities for writing when studying classification of animals.
- History: Debate surrounding which monarch was most influential.



Opportunities to build cultural capital
