

Learning Exploration: Somewhere to Settle

It is important for our children to understand migration as this is a significant, global issue, frequently featured in the news and discussed in society. This theme is particularly relevant for us as a school community, as we have many members of our school community who have recently migrated from various countries around the world to the UK. We aim to develop children's understanding of how population growth changes over time and impacts on local and global resources. By studying migration and its impact on population growth, the children will develop a deeper understanding of the relationship between people and the environment. This links to global learning, specifically the development of empathy towards others. By exploring the stories of migrants, including those affected by the Windrush scandal, children will develop a greater sense of empathy towards people from different backgrounds and cultures. Through our Global Learning, we will explore ways which migrants have been affected by prejudice and discrimination; this will lead children to develop a deeper understanding of the need for tolerance and respect for others. By exploring the range of different perspectives on migration, including those who support and those who oppose migration, children will develop the ability to listen to and understand different viewpoints. Finally, we aim to ensure that children know and understand the basics of how their own country is governed. This will assist in developing a deeper understanding of the democratic process and their own role as citizens.

Hook into learning:

Children will be challenged to work collaboratively to design their own country, deciding where they would build settlements and why.

Journey through the exploration

This exploration will commence by allowing children to work collaboratively to design their own country, deciding where they would build settlements and why. After experiencing this, children will then consider what makes people settle in different geographical areas such as near rivers or mountains. While exploring different settlements, children will answer the key question why do people settle in various cities around the world? As well as looking at reasons for settling in different cities, children will investigate similarities and differences between different cities including comparing population growth. As one of the reasons for population changes, children will explore the key question what are the main reasons for migration (including pull and push factors)? This will enable children to build an in-depth understanding of the human geographical process of migration. Children will then be encouraged to ask their own questions about how migration changes landscapes and places over time. The exploration will culminate with an immersive experience where children will be able to demonstrate their learning from the half term.
